

## México Podcast Chatter – July 8, 2026

Our main podcast recommendation this week is Hablemos. Marking the end of Mexico's World Cup run and the final match played on Mexican soil last Sunday, Denise Maerker speaks with Javier Aguirre about the national team's performance, the lessons from the tournament, and the structural challenges Mexican football must address to compete at the highest level. Beyond the sporting assessment, the conversation offers a broader reflection on leadership, talent development, and the long-term challenges of building a truly competitive project.

In business and economics, Dimes y Billetes, MexMoves, Rodcast, Fintech Leaders, and La Estrategia del Día agree that competitiveness will increasingly depend on the ability to combine technological innovation, infrastructure, and investment certainty. The episodes analyze everything from the economic impact of hosting a World Cup and the energy infrastructure required for nearshoring, to the transformation driven by agentic AI and stablecoins in business models. Taken together, they show that economic growth will be shaped both by technology adoption and by the ability to create favorable conditions for long-term investment.

In domestic politics, Botepronto, Política y Otros Datos, Tercer Grado, and El Noti agree that the Mexico–United States relationship continues to define the country's political agenda. The episodes examine uncertainty surrounding the USMCA review, growing U.S. pressure on security and organized crime, and Morena's internal tensions ahead of the 2027 elections. Together, the conversations reflect how trade, security, and governance issues are becoming increasingly intertwined.

On security, Narcosistema examines the political and judicial implications of the potential extradition of El Jardinero, one of the main leaders of the CJNG, while El Noti follows the impact of organized crime and corruption cases on the bilateral agenda with the United States. Together, the episodes show that security cooperation will remain one of the main pillars of the relationship between both countries and a constant source of political pressure for the Mexican government.

Finally, in history and culture, Sal con Amigos, Ciberdiálogos, and El Colegio de México address different aspects of the country's identity and institutional development. While Sal con Amigos reflects on the World Cup as a phenomenon of social cohesion and national identity, Ciberdiálogos analyzes the political transformations taking place across Latin America, and El Colegio de México uses the case of the Tula River to discuss the challenges of environmental governance and institutional strengthening in Mexico. Taken together, the episodes show how culture, politics, and institutions remain essential to understanding the country's long-term challenges.

### **Agentic AI Is Reshaping Business Transformation — Rodcast**

Rodcast features Phil Sebok, Country Manager of Wonderful AI in Mexico, in a discussion on how agentic AI is redefining enterprise digital transformation. Sebok argues that the next generation of AI can automate end-to-end business processes and boost productivity beyond simple cost reduction, while emphasizing the importance of focusing on specific use cases, establishing strong data governance, and adapting organizational culture to fully capture its potential. The conversation also explores Mexico's digitalization challenges, the opportunity to democratize AI across traditional industries, and the implications of this technological shift for leadership, talent management, and business models. Overall, the episode argues that agentic AI represents a structural transformation that will require companies to rethink how they operate, innovate, and drive long-term growth.

## **Mexican Political Affairs**

### **Javier Aguirre Reflects on Mexico's World Cup Campaign and the Future of Mexican Football – Hablemos**

In an interview with Denisse Maerker following Mexico's World Cup elimination, Javier Aguirre reflects on the national team's tournament, his personal journey across three World Cups as head coach, and the evolution of Mexican football.
